About the Poll

These results are based on a poll of 500 voters who participated in the November 2, 2010 general election for Massachusetts Governor. Live telephone interviews were conducted November 3, 2010 via both landline and cell phone by Eastern Research Services. Because precise voter turnout figures by demographic group are not available at this time, the demographic makeup of the sample was derived from analysis of gross turnout figures for this election, demographic figures from previous election cycles, and current political trends. The margin of sampling error is $\pm 1/4$ percent with a 95 percent level of confidence.
